## 5. GRANTS

### **Big Lottery Fund: Jubilee People's Millions Competition Launched for 2011**

The Big Lottery Fund has launched a re-branded version of the People's Millions Competition for 2011. The Jubilee People's Millions will give communities throughout the UK the opportunity to win local public support and share in £3.6 million of Lottery funding, marking the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. Grants of between £20,000 and £60,000 will be provided for projects that transform local environments and offer opportunities or facilities for people to take part and enjoy their local area. This will include initiatives focusing on buildings, amenities, public and green spaces and natural habitats.

Voluntary and community groups, social enterprises, local authorities, schools and statutory health organisations are invited to apply.

Head-to-head competitions will take place in the local ITV regions in June, when the public will be able to cast their vote for the projects they want to win. Four awards will be made to the winning projects in each of the 15 ITV regions. Successful organisations will be expected to have projects up and running by February 2012 in order to maximise opportunities for promotion during the Diamond Jubilee Year.

### **Big Voice Competition (UK)**

BT has announced that its Big Voice competition is now open for entries. The Big Voice Competition is open to groups of between five and eight students working together to develop innovative yet practical ideas on diversity and inclusion in the UK such as:

- how could your community become a better place for all the people who live, work and go to school in; and
- how those ideas can be communicated through an inspirational short film.

Big Voice will provide a film crew to do so, and then will show the film on giant screens in city centres around the UK as part of the build-up to the London 2012 Olympics and Paralympic Games.

All winning proposals will receive the same support: 3 days of shooting with a small crew equipped to a professional standard, plus 30 hours of post-production services (editing, music dubbing, titling, etc.). Each film will be given a budget of £1,000. The deadline for submitting proposals is summer 2011 half term.

### **Funding for Christian based Community Transformation Projects (UK)**

Westhill Endowment offers grants of between £1000 and £20,000 to support community-transforming projects with strong underlying Christian Values that transform people's lives, foster empathy between communities and build bridges between people of diverse backgrounds and cultures.

Westhill Endowment's objectives are the promotion of education in the manner which reflects the principles of the Christian religion and the tradition of the historic free churches and the promotion of dialogue and educational interchange between the Christian Church and other living faiths.

Grants in the past have been made to a wide range of projects including:

- Birmingham Churches Together which received funding towards assisting disadvantaged people in developing their basic skills within a Christian context;
- the Association of Church College Trusts (ACCT) for the development of a Virtual Religious Education Centre; and
- Butts Primary School, Walsall, which received support towards a prayer room for parents.

### **BBC Children in Need Grants Scheme (UK)**

BBC Children in Need are inviting not-for-profit organisations (including registered charities, voluntary organisations, schools, local authorities, churches, social enterprises, community interest groups, universities etc) working with disadvantaged children and young people 18 years and under, living in the UK, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands, to apply for grants.

BBC Children in Need run two grant schemes:

1. Small Grants of £10,000 or less per year for up to three years and
2. Main Grants over £10,000 per year for up to three years.

BBC Children in Need can only fund projects that focus on the differences made (outcomes) to the lives of disadvantaged children and young people. BBC Children in Need aims to fund projects where a small amount can make a real contribution to the success of the project. Grants can be used to cover both, capital and revenue costs.

### **From the Field Award (UK)**

The Royal Geographical Society, in collaboration with The Goldsmiths' Company, is offering secondary level geography teachers bursaries of up to £500 to help them develop educational resources that will give pupils an insight into the research being carried out by geographers on some of the key global geographical issues. These can range from climate change, to the loss of species, population growth or migration.

The resources will give young people and their teachers a greater insight into what fieldwork involves, the challenges of working in often inhospitable environments, and how, and for what purpose, key data on some of the world's pressing issues actually are collected. Funds can also be provided to the researcher to allow a class visit/presentation.

### **Funding for Links with Japan (UK)**

The Daiwa Foundation which supports closer links between Britain and Japan is seeking applications under its small grants programme. Grants of £3,000-£7,000 are available to individuals, societies, associations or other bodies in the UK or Japan to promote and support interaction between the two countries.

Daiwa Foundation Small Grants can cover all fields of activity, including educational and grassroots exchanges, research travel, the organisation of conferences, exhibitions, and other projects and events that fulfill this broad objective. New initiatives are especially encouraged.

### **Young Film Fund (UK)**

First Light Movies provides grants to projects that enable young people to participate in all aspects of film production has announced that its Young Film Fund will re-open for applications on the 15th November 2010. Since launching in 2001, First Light Movies have enabled over 12,000 young filmmakers to write, act, shoot, light, direct and produce over 800 films.

The funding is available to organisations such as schools, youth services, community and voluntary groups that work with young people aged between 5 and 18. Every year approximately £700,000 of grants are available through three funding streams:

1. The Studio Awards provides grants of up to £30,000 for between two and four films of up to 10 minutes;
2. The Script Awards provides grants of up to £3,000 for script writing projects that team young people with script professionals; and
3. The Pilot Awards provides grants of up to £5,000 for one short film of up to five minutes in duration.

### **Tree Planting Packs Available to Community Groups, Schools and Youth Groups (UK)**

The Woodland Trust has announced that Community and Youth Groups as well as Schools can now register to receive free tree planting packs. The tree planting packs are designed to help plant more trees, hedges and copses in their local shared spaces - by a church, community centre or playground for example, or on patches of land that are currently unused. Community Groups, Schools and Youth Groups can apply either for either planting as a small wooded area or 'copse' or planting a hedgerow.

### **Young Roots (UK)**

Young Roots offers grants of between £5,000 and £25,000. The scheme aims to involve 13-20 year-olds (up to 25 for those with special needs) in finding out about their heritage, developing skills, building confidence and promoting community involvement.

Projects needs to be related to the local and culturally varied heritage of the UK. For example, it could involve young people researching a local archive or doing practical casework on a nature reserve. Projects must also show how young people are managing and participating in the project. Projects should develop partnerships between youth organisations and heritage organisations. Projects should promote social inclusion and equal opportunities by involving a wide range of young people of different abilities and cultural backgrounds.

### **Football Foundation's Facilities Fund (England)**

The Football Foundation, through its facilities scheme is offering grants to football clubs, multi-sports clubs, local authorities, all educational establishments, registered charitable organisations/not for profit companies, industrial and provident societies/unincorporated not for profit organisations.

The aim is to support projects that:

- improve the facilities for football and other sport in local communities;
- sustain or increase participation amongst children and adults;
- help children and adults to develop their physical, mental, social and moral capacities through regular participation in sport.

Grants can be used towards grass pitches drainage/improvements; pavilions, clubhouses and changing rooms; artificial turf pitches and multi-use games areas; fixed floodlights for artificial pitches, and the maximum grant the foundation will provide is £1 million or 90% of the project cost.

For example, Fernwood Comprehensive School received £282,4810 to build a synthetic pitch and drainage of grass pitches.

The Foundation also provides development (revenue) grants to deliver football development associated with the new facility e.g. coaching, football development officer etc. For further information <http://www.footballfoundation.org.uk/apply/facilities-grants/>

### **Funding for Youth Trips in Germany (UK)**

UK school, FE Colleges and youth groups within the UK can apply for grants of up to £750 through the Instant Impact Project Fund to support taster trips and visits to Germany for young people.

The criteria include:

The scheme is aimed at schools and youth groups that have not previously visited the other country;

- there is a sustainability element to the link;
- at least 75% of the time during the visit is spent taking part in interactive and educational joint activity between young people from the UK and German partner institutions;
- the trip includes young people who would otherwise not have the chance to take part;
- the main beneficiaries are young people; and
- the trip includes a strong new element or significant development of the young people's contact with the other country.

Applications can be submitted at any time, however applications must be submitted at least 4 weeks in advance of the trip.

## **O2 Programme for Young People (UK)**

The O2 programme supports projects by young people (13 - 25) that have a positive impact upon their community. The new programme Think Big will offer young people up to £300 in grants as well as training, support and mentoring from a number of youth charities. These include the National Youth Agency and UK Youth.

## **The Mark Leonard Trust (UK)**

Not for profit organisations and organisation with a charitable purpose can apply for funding through the Mark Leonard Trust. The Mark Leonard Trust is one of the Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts and focuses on environmental education in the UK.

In particular the Trust seeks to support projects that focus on:

- finding practical ways of involving children and young adults;
- sustainable agriculture and bio-diversity;
- sustainable transport, energy efficiency and renewable energy; and
- youth work that supports the rehabilitation of young people involved in anti-social or criminal activities.

## **Funding to Support Disadvantaged Young People (UK)**

LandAid, the property industry's charity which supports projects that help disadvantaged or homeless people (particularly young people) has announced that its grants programme is currently open for applications.

Grants of between £5,000 and £25,000 are available to support projects that:

- provide accommodation or assist in meeting accommodation needs;
- refurbish or renew facilities; and
- deliver training, life skills or other educational programmes.

Previous projects include a grant of £8,800 to New Horizon Youth Centre in Kings Cross for workshops to educate young people about gun and knife crime and Robert Blair Primary School in Islington which received a grant of £7,500 for the refurbishment of school rooftop to create a safe play area for young children.

## **Barclays Community Sport Award (UK)**

Barclays Spaces for Sports has announced the launch of its new Community Sports Award. The Award is a new award to recognise the outstanding achievements of individuals and groups that use sport to benefit communities across the UK.

Each month, the winner of the award will receive £1,000 for their group or organisation, a limited edition trophy and will be entered into the end of season award to win a further £5,000. Nominations can be made for any individual, group of individuals or not-for-profit organisation. For example, Active Meadowlands received funding. The project is located in Radford Diamond Neighbourhood, Coventry, a 'high priority neighbourhood'. The programme offers a wide range of activities which include basketball, football, tennis, bowls, walking, tournaments, competitions and events.

### **Community Awards (UK)**

The Tesco Charity Trust Community Awards Scheme provides one-off donations of between £500 and £4,000 to local projects that support children and their education and welfare, elderly people and adults and children with disabilities.

Grants of up to £10,000 (£5,000 in Wales) are available to community based organisations and schools for a wide range of projects.

Awards for All aims to make the application process as simple as possible and applications can be submitted at any time.

### **ACT Foundation (UK)**

Individuals in need and charities that work to enhance the quality of life for people in need (specifically the mentally and physically disabled) can apply for funding the ACT Foundation's grant programme.

The Foundation makes grants to support:

- the modifications to homes, schools, hospices etc;
- the provision of specialist equipment such as specialised wheelchairs, other mobility aids and equipment including medical equipment to assist independent living; and
- financial assistance towards the cost of short-term respite breaks at a registered respite centre.

### **The Fidelio Trust (UK)**

The Fidelio Trust is inviting applications from Colleges, Arts Festivals and other arts organisations seeking financial support for individuals or groups of exceptional ability to enable them to:

- receive special tuition or coaching;
- participate in external competitions;
- be supported for a specially arranged performance;
- receive support for a special publication, musical composition or work of art.

The Trust offers grants of up to £5,000 in support of the Arts, in particular the dramatic and operatic arts, music, speech and dance.

### **Partnership Grants Scheme for Primary and Secondary Schools (UK)**

The Royal Society's Grants Scheme for Primary and Secondary Schools will open on 3 January 2011 and close on 25 February 2011. Through the scheme grants of between £250 and £3,000 will be available to support teachers, scientists and engineers help develop science projects. The aim is to make the teaching of science more interesting within primary and secondary schools.

The Partnership grants scheme forms partnerships to allow teachers to increase their scientific knowledge and to give scientists and engineers the chance to develop their communication skills and engage with enquiring young minds. Any UK primary or secondary school teacher or practising scientist/engineer can apply as long as the students involved in the project are between 5 and 18. Applications must be made together with the partner, and need to be signed by the teacher, partner and schools' headteacher. <http://royalsociety.org/Partnership/>

### **Equitable Charitable Trust (UK)**

Charitable organisations (and schools specifically for children and young people with disabilities or Special Educational Needs) working towards educating young people, especially young people with disabilities and/or from disadvantaged backgrounds can apply for funding of up to £30,000 through the Equitable Charitable Trust. The Trustees award approximately £1 million a year and seeks to identify and support good projects that address needs not adequately met at present, including those with potential to be introduced to large numbers of schools.

Grants made by the Trust fall into three broad categories:

1. Education projects or services that support the learning and development of disabled children and young people in the UK;
2. Education projects for disadvantaged children and young people in the UK, particularly those that support delivery of the National Curriculum or vocational learning opportunities; and
3. Education projects that will help increase participation in, or improve the quality of, education for disadvantaged or disabled children and young people in developing countries.

The length of funding can range from one to three years. Previously supported projects include supplementary Maths, English and Science classes for disadvantaged 5-18 year olds; education projects to reduce teenage pregnancies; capital grants for the renovation and refurbishment of facilities for children with complex needs and disabilities; and music education projects for children and young people with profound and multiple learning difficulties.

Applications can be submitted at any time and are considered on a rolling basis by the Trustees.

**Youth Music Open Programme** Your project must provide structured, regular and progressive music-making activities for children and young people between the ages of 0 and 18 years. Music-making with young people up to the age of 25 is eligible if the young people are: in detention, have special educational needs; or have disabilities.

Project grant requests must be between £5,000 and £30,000.

Open Programme projects must be between 6 and 24 months in duration.

Children and young people must be involved in the decision making and on-going development of the Youth Music project.

Please note we are not able to support individuals. Applications are welcomed from charities that have an annual turnover of less than £100,000 per annum. Larger or national charities will normally not be considered under this scheme. Nor will the Scheme generally support charities that are able consistently to generate operational surpluses or which have been able to build up unrestricted reserves to a level equivalent to three months turnover.

We plan to make one year grants of between £1,000 and £10,000 to charities which can demonstrate that such a grant will make a significant difference to their work. If you cannot demonstrate this, your application will be declined. No multi-year funding awards will be made.

### **UK- German Challenge Fund (UK)**

Primary, secondary schools and FE colleges as well as youth groups in the UK and Germany are able to apply for funding support through the UK – German Challenge Fund. The aim of the fund is to develop curricular and extra-curricular projects between UK and German schools and youth groups that encourage young people to pick a topic or subject of their choice and explore it in an international context.

Grants provided through the UK-German Challenge Fund cover project costs, joint activities and reciprocal partner visits. The total amount of grant provided will be judged on a case-by-case basis, depending on the size, circumstances and numbers involved in the individual projects. The Challenge Fund provides grants of normally 50% towards the overall costs; in exceptional circumstances, the grant can cover up to a maximum of 75% of the total costs. Grants are available for both large and small projects and the amount can be to anything up to, but will not exceed £5,000.

Examples of project themes and activities are:

- Science and technology: research, explore and experiment together!
- Business and enterprise: set up a mini-company or marketing campaign, take part in work experience
- Citizenship: design & create a service for your communities
- Multimedia and ICT: create a webpage, film, blog or write your own song
- Music, dance and drama: create and perform a joint musical
- History: step back in time and recreate an historical event
- Energy and the environment: design your own recycling plant
- Politics and public speaking: get involved in debating workshops and competitions

### **Funding for Science Projects in Schools (UK)**

The Royal Society has announced that the Partnership Grants will re-open open for applications on the 3rd January 2011. Through the scheme grants of between £250 and £3,000 will be available to support teachers, scientists and engineers help develop science projects. The aim is to make the teaching of science more interesting within primary and secondary schools.

The Partnership grants scheme forms partnerships to allow teachers to increase their scientific knowledge and to give scientists and engineers the chance to develop their communication skills and engage with enquiring young minds. Any UK primary or secondary school teacher or practicing scientist/engineer can apply as long as the students involved in the project are between 5 and 18. Applications must be made together with the partner, and need to be signed by the teacher, partner and schools' headteacher.

### **Grants for Teaching Physics (UK)**

Schools and Colleges within the UK that wish to promote the teaching of physics are able to apply for a grant of up to £500 through the Institute of Physics. In particular, the Institute is looking to support projects linked to astronomy, space and particle physics.

The type of projects supported could include:

- running a school/college based science week activity;
- purchasing materials/resources outside of the normal department resources; and

- organising a visit to or from a working physicist.

The scheme is open to all UK educational institutions (schools and colleges) catering for pupils/students in the age range 5-18. Since the scheme was established in 2005 the STFC and IOP have awarded almost £250,000 to projects that have benefited over 94,000 pupils.

### **Young Persons Volunteering Fund (England, Scotland and Wales)**

The Sita Trust has announced the next funding round of its new Young Person's Volunteering Fund. Through this new fund, the SITA Trust can provide grants of up to £10,000 for volunteering projects owned by 14-25 year olds.

The SITA Trust can support projects in any of 90 funding zones around qualifying waste processing sites operated by their donor, SITA UK. This fund has been created to assist young people aged 14-25 to volunteer their time to create or enhance facilities that can be enjoyed by the wider community. This could include the Trust providing funding towards the resources required by young volunteers to transform a derelict piece of land into a community green space or give a local community centre a much needed make-over.

To be eligible applicants must be able to demonstrate that young people will be fully involved in the design and development of the project and projects must be compliant with the rules of the Landfill Communities Fund. Projects on school or pre-school sites where the facilities provided will primarily benefit the school are not eligible for funding. However, an application may be considered if the following can be clearly demonstrated:

- the wider community has significant opportunities to use the schools facility; and
- the facility is run by an organisation that is separate from the school (although the school may be represented).

### **Supergrounds for Schools (UK)**

Supergrounds is a £6 million community investment programme, funded by the Royal Bank of Scotland group (Royal Bank of Scotland, NatWest, Ulster Bank or other RBS group company) and delivered through Learning through Landscape, that helps primary schools improve their school grounds.

### **Home Access Grants (England)**

Home Access, which is a government drive that helps low-income families who currently lack access to a computer and/or internet to get online at home to support learning, has announced that due to the success of the programme that they are now **only inviting applications for computers for children with profound disabilities or Special Educational Needs.**

Home access is available to families in receipt of certain benefits that have a child of between 3 and 9 years:

- who attends a state-maintained school in England full time;
- who has not already had a computer from a Home Access Grant or similar programme, such as Computers for Pupils; and
- **who has a Statement of Special Educational Needs, or receives a Disability Living Allowance, or whose school/local authority representative can certify they have Assistive Technology needs.**

Organisation such as schools, charities or a local authorities can sign up to gain access to the Home Access partner area where they can download posters, leaflets and other marketing materials to help them promote Home Access in their community.

### **Playground Partnerships Awards Open for Applications (UK)**

### **Funding for Alcohol Education Projects (UK)**

The Drinkaware Trust "Ideas Fund" awards small grants of between £100 and £2,500 to local community (and occasionally national) initiatives designed to promote responsible drinking and reduce alcohol related harm. - To raise awareness about long term health harms caused by hazardous or harmful levels of drinking.

The Trust accepts applications from; registered charities; other voluntary organisations; and statutory organisations and partnerships. In addition the Trust also makes grants of up to £25,000 for larger projects that undertake direct, hands-on work with individuals and the community as well as grants of up to £100,000 to help larger scale projects pack a more powerful punch or reach a wider audience.
